This year marked a trifecta of milestones for Triton College! Our 60-year anniversary, attainment of a 10-year accreditation from the Higher Learning Commission and the joyous celebration of our students' achievement at commencement. Here are some highlights:

Unearthing Memories

The campus community came together to unearth a time capsule buried on campus for 30 years. After a successful excavation, more than 100 unique artifacts were recovered. A selection of artifacts was on display at the Triton College Library. The artifacts illustrate the sense of community and importance of education, which are still at the heart of our campus today.

Honoring the Academic Achievements of Students

To honor the accomplishments of its graduating class of 2024, Triton held its 58th Commencement Ceremony on May 18. The college held a Nurse Pinning Ceremony on May 16 and a Workforce Equity Initiative (WEI) Completion Ceremony on May 20. A total of 1,100 Triton students graduated in May and, combined with graduates from August and December, the total number of program graduates reached 1,700. Impressive numbers! Triton's Adult Education Department hosted its 45th GED Graduation and End-of-Year Celebration June 8 to commemorate the accomplishments of 112 Adult Education students. The ceremony honored English as a Second Language (ESL) Program completers, Westlake Health Foundation Scholarship Program completers, Triton College Board of Trustees Scholarship recipients, National Adult Education Honor Society inductees and Illinois High School Diploma (formerly High School Equivalency) graduates. In July, Triton held a graduation to honor students who successfully completed the college's Skill Enhancement and Employee Development (S.E.E.D.) Program.


Triton Graduates its First Dual Degree Program Cohort

Four students from Ridgewood High School graduated this past May not only with their high school diplomas, but also earned associate degrees thanks to Triton College's Early College Program. With support, the graduates successfully balanced the demands of both high school and college coursework. Triton's program is a collaboration between in-district high schools and the college, enabling students to earn an associate degree while completing their high school education. The Ridgewood graduates represent Triton College's first Dual Degree Program cohort, with two students earning an Associate in Science degree and two earning an Associate in Arts degree while receiving their high school diploma. All four students are continuing their education, transferring to four-year universities as juniors. This achievement highlights the benefits of Triton College's Early College Program, providing students with a significant cost savings and advanced educational opportunities.

New Respiratory Care Program Successfully Launched

Triton College welcomed its first student cohort in the new Respiratory Care Program. The program is designed to prepare students to become registered respiratory therapists — an in-demand career path. With state-of-the-art classrooms equipped with the latest technologies and expert instruction, our students will be prepared to make a vital impact in health care. According to Dr. Peter Jaswilko, Triton's Allied Health chairperson, respiratory therapists "are so in-demand that students who graduate from our program and pass the board exam could get a job in any hospital."

Respiratory therapists can improve patient outcomes, participate in research, evaluate interventions and technology, educate patients and their families, perform medical therapies and more. "Many individuals can't say that they work in a field where every single day they are saving human life," said Dr. Jaswilko. "That's what respiratory care therapists do ... they are constantly working to preserve and save lives."




Triton College has announced a new Barber Certificate Program designed to offer students a comprehensive education in the art and science of barbering.

Jael Rodriguez Wins Illinois' Model Illinois Government Simulation

Jael Rodriguez won the 2024 Model Illinois Government (MIG) simulation held in Springfield, Illinois. "It felt incredible to hear my name being called as the winner for the elective position," said Rodriguez. "I was very surprised, but it felt amazing to be able to accomplish such a grand achievement." Rodriguez competed against 150 students from multiple colleges across the state and will serve as secretary of state at the next MIG competition. Triton students Emily Urueta-Hernandez, Sorin Valeanu, Mark Kouria and Jesse Ellen Whisler also participated.

"MIG is an intercollegiate Illinois government simulation," according to George Lam, economics instructor who oversees Triton's MIG chapter. The simulation provides Illinois students with an in-depth experience at how the Illinois state government works. Rodriguez served as House Democrat for a second consecutive year, while Urueta-Hernandez and Valeanu took on the roles of lobbyists. Whisler served as a Republican senator and Mark Kouria represented the House Republican Party.


Hallah Elder Earns Lurie Children's Young Professionals Scholarship Award

A Great Year to be a Trojan!

The men's basketball team earned the national runner-up spot in the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Division 1 championship game played in Hutchinson, Kansas, aired on ESPNU. The Trojans finished their season 34-3, tying the most wins in team history. The wrestling team was recognized for competing in the NJCAA's Wrestling Championship in Council Bluffs, Iowa. For a second straight year, the team was the Great Lakes District champions and Region 4 champs.

Trinity Barnes, guard, Triton women's basketball, broke Triton's 43-year scoring record and is the fourth Triton women's basketball player in the program's 50-year history to eclipse the 1,000-career-point total. Following commencement, Barnes accepted a full scholarship at a four-year university.

Five Triton College student-athletes earned the prestigious title of All-American, among other accolades:

- Amar Augillard was named the 2024 NJCAA DI Player of the Year Men's Basketball.
- Dylan Williams earned the Best Small Man Award at the March 30 NJCAA DI Men's Basketball championship game in Hutchinson, Kansas.
- Ava Connerty, Triton women's track and field, earned All-American status at the May 9-11 NCJAA D3 Outdoor Championship in Utica, New York.
- Ghee Rachal, Triton men's wrestling, was named the Triton College Athlete of the Month for December following his
 championship showing at the 32nd Art Kraft Memorial Tournament. Anthony Schickel, Triton men's wrestling, had
 a repeat run this past academic year as an All-American when he placed third at nationals the highest for a Triton
 individual wrestler since 2018.

Five student-athletes from the men's basketball team also earned full scholarships at four-year institutions following Commencement.

Triton's Neurodiversity Efforts Garnering National Attention

Triton College's neurodiversity efforts and strategies gained national attention this year. The February/ March 2024 edition of *American Association of Community College's (AACC) CC Journal* showcased Triton College and Hilary Meyer, dean of Academic Success. The feature follows an exclusive article published this past fall in *AACC's CCDaily*. In addition, Meyer's article *From Awareness to Acceptance to Action: Build a Neuroinclusive Campus Community*, was published in *The Society for College and University Planning* in August. Colleges like Triton have increased efforts to welcome and support neurodiverse students.



Troy Mart Awarded

The Educational Credit Management Corporation (ECMC) donated \$10,000 to Troy Mart — Triton College's food pantry. Troy Mart also received a \$2,500 donation from Sysco Chicago. The donations help Triton to expand its offering to students. Opened in 2023, Troy Mart serves hundreds of students by providing food and other basic need items. It's partners like Sysco and ECMC that enable Triton to continue fostering a nurturing and supportive environment, enabling students to focus on their studies.

Celebrating Excellence in the Classroom

Antigone Sharris, full-time faculty and chair of Triton College's Engineering Technology, received the Outstanding Faculty of the Year Award. The award recognizes college faculty who have gone above and beyond in teaching, mentorship and service, making a significant impact on both students and colleagues. "This award feels very humbling," said Sharris. "The most rewarding part about my job is the students. It is so gratifying to hear when a student earned a degree and found a job. I want them to find success." Sharris is also an advisor for the Chi Zeta Chapter of Phi Theta Kappa and leads youth-based programs in STEM. She earned a Master of Science in industrial operations and management from the Illinois Institute of Technology and a Bachelor of Science in occupational and practice arts education from the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign.

Marina Demos, adjunct psychology instructor, received the Outstanding Adjunct Faculty Award. "I feel beyond grateful," said Demos. "Our Triton students make teaching such a pleasure." Demos has taught at Triton since 2001 and earned a Master of Science in clinical psychology from Concordia University Chicago.

Summary of Fiscal Year 2024



Below is the combined Educational Fund, and Unrestricted Operations and Maintenance Fund summary.


